
Once Upon A Parsnip



When two or three people work together on a project, they are also a team. Another word for that is a *partnership*.





Writing a book



Our Parsnip Partnership is now three people. I did not meet Ben until after our book was published, but we were still partners!





Parsnips are good for a snack. You can also use them in recipes. Once Upon a Parsnip has a recipe for appleparsnip soup in it.




Parsnips look like white carrots.
